the photos I scanned, I discovered that I really loved learning about the history of Hendricks County and its people.

When Hendricks Regional Health reached out to the Museum for assistance in researching their archives for information for their 60th anniversary celebration in 2022, Linda asked if I would be interested. I agreed even though I had never overseen a project with that sort of scope. For around 6 months, I worked in the organization's basement sorting through around 40 boxes of archives. In addition, I visited local libraries and online repositories to learn more about the hospital's history. After I had reviewed all the archives, the hospital asked if I would be willing to help compile artifacts for their newly built display cases. I spent 3 months on the displays that were unveiled at a special ceremony in December. It was hard work, but very worth it! The hospital opened in 1962, but I discovered documents that traced the very beginnings of the hospital back to 1957 when Muriel Blair first proposed the idea of a county hospital at a Hendricks County Federated Clubs meeting. I helped the hospital locate Muriel's grandchildren and they attended the celebration in December. It was really special for me to watch them view the display with Muriel's picture and notes in it.

Through my volunteer work with the Museum and my research for Hendricks Regional Health, I realized that I could potentially have a career in archives. In the summer of 2022, I enrolled in the Archive Management graduate certificate program through IU. I'm presently in my third class (of six) toward the certificate. I was both fortunate and grateful when the Museum allowed me to do a Digital Archives internship in Fall 2022. I learned a lot about the collections at the museum, how the museum operates, and the value of the museum in the community, as they help preserve local history and genealogy. I also have come to know several of the great volunteers there with whom I really enjoy working. The Museum elected to keep me on staff at least through April, as an Archives Collection Specialist. My goal (for now) is to organize family collections, and ensure their artifacts, documents, and photos are in the collection management software (PastPerfect.) By doing this, we will have ready access to information for anyone doing research on a specific family. There is the potential for bringing this all online, but we aren't quite ready for that yet. The Museum has so many precious and interesting items in their collection and I hope that my work can help bring this to light so everyone in the community can see the Museum for the gem that it is.



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The cost of printing and mailing our quarterly newsletter has raised considerably, due to the fact that Rex Wilson, of Wilson Printing, has retired, and the rising costs of stamps and envelopes. We are grateful to Rex for his help throughout the years and wish him the best of health and happiness.

Danville, Indiana (Center Township):

Established in 1834 as the county seat of Hendricks County, Danville has always been the heart of the county's government. Selected because of its location in the center of the county, Danville is home to the Hendricks County Courthouse. The current courthouse, erected in 1912 is actually the 4th building the served in this capacity. According to the book "Danville" (authored by Jeff Baldwin) the first courthouse was a log structure built around 1826, followed by a wood frame building used between 1832-1858. Then came an elaborate brick Gothic Revival styed building that was erected between 1859-1863. This building came to an unfortunate end on January 12, 1912, when the roof over the 2nd floor courtroom collapsed. After inspection, it was decided to raze the building and construct a new courthouse. The 4th building's (the current one) cornerstone was laid on May 20, 1913 and this has been Hendricks County's government home since then. As progress happened, an annex was needed and the former Center Township School/South Elementary (built in 1928 and stopped being used as a school in 1994) was retrofitted to accommodate some of the government offices (355 S. Washington St.).

The old Hendricks County Jail (170 S. Washington St.) was constructed in 1866 and served as a jail and Sheriff's residence until 1974. The Hendricks County Museum now occupies the building. Visitors to the museum can venture into the old jail cells, as well as experience different eras in the rooms of the residence.

Danville is host to many events throughout the year, including fall festivals around the courthouse square, a farmer's market, Christmas Wonderland at Ellis Park, Fourth of July concert and fireworks, and the Hendricks County Fair.





In response to our previous issue's inquiry about the history of Brown's Camp, Betty Bartley at The Republican did some exploring and gave us more insight as to this postcard that is one of many in our digital collection, https://hendrickscountymuseum.org/digital-collections/ Thank you Betty!

"Tourist Camps Were Popular Stops"

"Emily Hanson [sic], a volunteer at the Hendricks County Museum sent us this picture postcard of Brown's Camp at Danville, Indiana, dated 1848. She said it was supposed to be located 12 miles west of Danville.

A quick look in the index to History of Hendricks County, 1914-1976, found the answer was in the Hugh C. Brown family. Hugh's son Walter, and his wife, Iola, built and operated Brown's Motel and Service Station between Danville and Avon, along U.S. 136.

The postcard shows the camp with a service station at the entrance to the camp, surrounded on three sides by "tourist cabins".

Beginning in the 1920's, tourist camps, or auto camps, began to appear along major highways. The advent of the automobile brought a newfound wanderlust to their owners. In Indiana, the highways where tourist camps were commonly found included the National Road (U.S. 40), the Lincoln Highway (U.S. 30), and the Pike's Peak Ocean-to-Ocean Highway, also known as the Rockville Road or U.S. 36."

Was John Dillinger ever a prisoner in the Hendricks County Jail?

No. However, according to an item in a 1934 issue of *The Republican*: "Danville can boast that **Mrs. Mary Kinder**, the gangster moll, captured with the notorious Dillinger gang in Tucson, Arizona last week spent most of the summer of 1932 right here, put up at Sheriff Lewis Pounds' two-story red brick hostelry at the corner of Washington and Broadway Streets. She spent most of her

time reading and looking out at the beautiful sunshine through iron bars."

Mary was a native of Morgan County, Indiana. At one point her husband, her lover Harry Pierpont, her brother, and her brother-in-law were all incarcerated at Michigan City. She was accused of assisting Dillinger in the escape of eleven members of his gang from prison. She was one of only two women listed on the "Chicago Public Enemies List" in 1933.
