The museum is looking to grow its digital photograph collection and we are asking residents of Hendricks County to help us!

On August 17th between 11:00 am to 3:00 pm, drop off up to 25 historic photographs at the museum. We'll scan them, return them to you, and collect any identifying information you have about the photographs.

Start digging through your attics, closets, and old shoeboxes! The museum is seeking historic Hendricks County photographs that fit the themes of Towns, Architecture, Schools, or Business. At this time, the museum is only able to accept and digitize photographs no larger than 11 inches by 17 inches. *Please allow 1-2 weeks for us to scan them.*

Anyone can participate in the Lend-to-Scan Day, but if you are not a member of the Hendricks County Museum, you will want to join! After all photographs are digitized, the museum will choose one member's collection to feature on our website.

McClung family pays a visit to the Museum


On July 19, a display at the museum received some very special visitors. The display is a U.S. Army uniform that belonged to Sergeant Laurel McClung (1932-1986.) Sergeant McClung was a lifelong Hendricks County resident and attended Pittsboro High School, graduating in 1951. He served in the U.S. Army in the Korean War, receiving the Korean Service Ribbon, the National Defense Service Medal, and the United Nations Service Medal. He attended Engineer School (Far East Command) for Combat Construction Specialist and his most significant duty assignment was in Hq & Hq Co. 19th Engineer Group.

The special visitors were Sergeant McClung's son, Joe McClung, Joe's daughter, Ariana Laurel, and grandson, Lincoln Joseph. The museum is grateful that the McClung family donated some of Sergeant McClung's artifacts and

Historical Museum has grand opening!



(This is the third of a series telling the Museum's story of how it came to be! Thank you Marty Carter, for providing this wonderful information!)

After that first Christmas open house in 1975, much of the next two years was spent

preparing the sheriff's residence to be a museum. Obviously through the years from 1866 until 1974 updates had been done to make the house a comfortable home for the sheriff's families. Now redecorating was to be done and furnishings found to return the house to the style of the late 1800's and early 20th century.

By November 20, 1977, the new roof was finished, painting and papering was done, and the Grand Opening of the Hendricks County Historical Museum was held. Arthur Himsel, president of the county commissioners, cut the ribbon,

past Historical Society president Sherman Crayton spoke, and museum board chair Dorothy Kelly welcomed guests.

In Mr. Crayton's address he asked the question, "What is the purpose of a museum?". It was not, he suggested, just to preserve an old building or to save old things, but to preserve the values they represent, to understand and appreciate the lives and values of those who came before us, and to remind us to be grateful.

Know Your Towns:

Coatesville, Indiana (Clay Township):

Platted in the late 1860s (original plat documents are missing), the town incorporated in 1909. The town benefitted from the railroad, which came right through downtown Coatesville. The businesses included a two-story hotel, livery stable, blacksmith, dry goods, and a pool room. (Not sure this was considered a "trouble"!)

However, things changed in 1948 when Coatesville was devastated by the 1948 Good Friday tornado. On March 26, 1948, a destructive tornado blew through town, demolishing everything in its path. In the end, at least 14 persons were killed and most of the downtown buildings were leveled. With winds estimated as high as 260 mph, the tornado cut a path from Clay County (Brazil, IN) to Marion County (Indianapolis).

Over the years Coatesville rebounded and now boasts a Community Building, the Coatesville Public Library, Fire Department, a funeral home, a mill, several churches, and various downtown businesses. Coatesville Cemetery is located just south of downtown. Coatesville is host to an annual car show each year as well.



The Hendricks County Museum was awarded a Heritage Grant from the Indiana Historical



Society to support the care and conservation of the museum's textile collections. The grant, which was awarded in October 2023, will be completed this summer.

In addition to conservation hangers and archival quilt boxes, we were able to add three conservation forms which will allow us to properly display military uniforms, men's suits, and ladies' dresses. The board is grateful to the Indiana Historical Society for their support in helping preserve the museum's unique collections.
